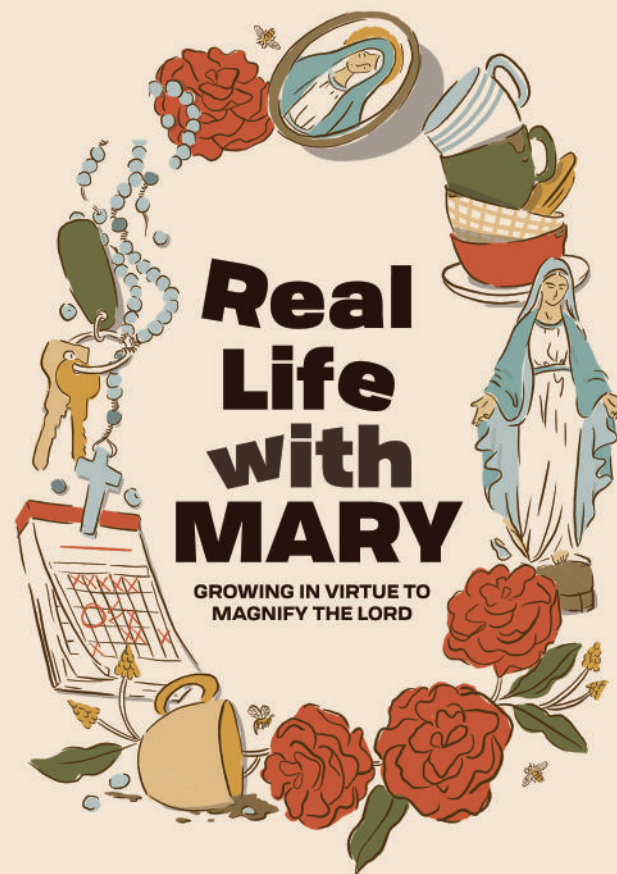

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Introduction

These days, people seem to be cool staying on the surface with one another. When someone asks, “How are you?” the answer is usually just one word: “Good.” But then there are those rare, beautiful moments when a friend will share something real with you. Something deep. Maybe it’s a struggle, a wound, an obstacle, or a part of their personal history that they usually keep private. When someone shares something so personal, they’re handing you a delicate treasure: the gift of their heart.

This is the kind of genuine friendship that Mary offers us. Through the gift of Scripture, Mary shares her real life with us: from her hardest struggles and most momentous sorrows to her greatest joys and victories. But she doesn’t just want our relationship with her to be a one-way street. She wants us to open up and share *our* lives with *her*. That is what the Rosary is all about: slipping your hand into Mary’s and asking her to walk with you as you open your heart to her, confident that she will treasure everything you share.

Each *Hail Mary* of this Rosary is a prayer for a different virtue: a *habit of being* that helps you choose good and thus grow closer to God with the help of the Holy Spirit. As you pray, think about the virtue you are praying for, and pay attention to the virtues that stand out to you the most. These may be the ones that Jesus wants to grow in you right now. Then, turn to Mary and ask her to pray for you, that you may have the grace to live these virtues and magnify the Lord with your life, just like she did.

Prayers of the Rosary

Apostles’ Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

Our Father

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Hail Mary

Hail, Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Prayer after the Rosary

O God, whose only begotten Son, by his life, death, and resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal salvation, grant, we beseech thee, that while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through Christ our Lord. Amen.

How to Pray the Rosary

Begin by making the *Sign of the Cross*.

1. While holding the crucifix, say the *Apostles’ Creed*.
2. On the first bead, say an *Our Father*.
3. Say one *Hail Mary* on each of the next three beads for an increase in the virtues of faith, hope, and charity.
4. Say the *Glory Be*.
5. For each of the five decades, announce the mystery and read the corresponding reflection. Then say the *Our Father*.
6. For each of the ten beads of the decade, say a *Hail Mary* while meditating on the mystery. Conclude each decade with a *Glory Be* and the *Fátima Prayer*.
7. After praying all five decades, say the *Hail Holy Queen* and *Prayer after the Rosary*. Conclude with the *Sign of the Cross*.

First Luminous Mystery: The Baptism of Jesus

Fruit of the Mystery: Openness to the Holy Spirit

From the moment John the Baptist pulled Jesus to the surface of the Jordan River, Jesus was catapulted into his ministry. His calling. His destiny. Not that he didn’t live those things before, of course. But it seems as though Jesus’ Baptism was the end of his hidden life and the start of something new. Something richer. And yes, something even more difficult. He was no longer simply a carpenter building furniture out of wood. Second Luminous Mystery: The Wedding at Cana

Fruit of the Mystery: “To Jesus through Mary”

I always thought the fruit of this mystery was kind of a strange fruit. *To Jesus through Mary?* That’s not a virtue. It’s not technically a “fruit.” It’s not even a full sentence. (Like, seriously, where’s the verb?) It wasn’t until I pondered it more that I began to appreciate it and came to understand that the Wedding at Cana shows us how Mary draws us closer to her Son. I wonder how the servers at the wedding responded to Mary’s command to, “Do whatever he tells you,” especially when what Jesus told them (to fill the jars with water when they needed wine) made exactly *zero* sense. Eventually, though, Scripture tells us the servers went and got the jars, filled them to the brim, and then drew a cup and took it to the chief steward of the wedding. Just like Jesus asked. I wonder *how* they did that, though. Maybe some of those servers took off at a sprint to “get ‘er done,” spurred forward by their total trust in Mary and Jesus. Maybe others were more skeptical, eyeing things up from the sidelines. Some may have been totally frozen in panic. I wonder if any actually walked out? Just flat out left? That’s when I realized that we can be just like those servers. Some days we are sprinting toward Jesus through Mary’s helpful direction. Some days it looks more like a crawl. Whatever the case, it doesn’t really matter what the verb is, as long as we are trekking toward Jesus and don’t walk out. This is what really matters.

How can I follow Mary’s advice to do whatever Jesus tells me today?
